


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Welcome to WRSU

WRSU has been proudly serving Rutgers and the New Brunswick community for more than 50 years, with a unique variety of innovative programming. Begun by a small group of students as a carrier-current operation in 1948, WRSU soon progressed to the AM dial and, since 1974, has been a fixture at 88.7 FM. Our 1400-watt signal reaches some 40 miles from New Brunswick.


DEPARTMENTS AT WRSU

Productions Department:

The WRSU Production Department dates back to 1799, but of course back then we called it the Raymond Thursgood Symphonic Octet and Ale Supplicants. This was before electricity, never mind radio, so you can imagine the non-existent hi-jinx that didn't ensue then!

OK, the truth is we don't know how the production department got to be the way it is. Some stuff happened, and now we're here. We meet at least once a week and work on recording public service announcements of varying lengths. Sometimes we get legitimately important PSA's in the mail and simply record them as-is. Sometimes we get ridiculously banal information and attempt to make the thing humorous, otherwise no one would want to listen to it. Sometimes we just find pamphlets around campus that have information we think the New Brunswick area needs to know so we spread the knowledge like cream cheese and jelly on a bagel.

With the rest of our time we write comedy sketches and record them for anyone wishing to play them on air. (This is mostly during our weekly show, "Non-Productive". Get it? Production department? Non-Productive? Yeah, we know, it wasn't our idea, but it's been passed along for quite some time and who are we to break with tradition?) Past Production projects (ooh, alliteration!) include a sitcom, a Mystery Science Theater rip-off, and a Stay in



(Adult) School Rap. Well, that last part was made up. We hope to incorporate all of these wonderful things (except the rap) into this year's show, which everyone in the department is welcome to be on (if we can find enough microphones).

Music Department:

The Music Department is responsible for the music you hear on the station (except for that one day they played "Funky Cold Medina" over and over again, we had nothing to do with that). Each week a flock of DJ's converge to listen to the music that arrived in the past week (usually more than a hundred different releases). If we like it, we add it to our playlist. We're also responsible for a huge record library that has been classified by the U.S. Government as a living organism. Really, it even has an SSN. We feed it bad records and try and keep it alphabetized, but it never seems to stay that way. 

News Department

The WRSU News Department broadcasts ten minutes of news twice a day, at noon and 10pm. All newscasts are anchored by one or two editors who write, edit and check all of the newscasts themselves, based on the Associated press wire. Each newscast consists of local news, state news, national news, international news a sportscast and the local forecast. The News Department is committed to giving you the news that you are interested in quickly and efficiently.

Additionally, the News Department also broadcasts a live, call-in news-oriented talk show. Our program, called *Knight Beat*, deals solely with the issues that involve Rutgers and affect Rutgers students. It airs every Tuesday night from 8 to 9 pm. 


